Harry Manley Allen was born November 24, 1924 in Spring Bay on Manitoulin Island in Ontario. His parents were Florence Harriet Rowe and Manley Allen. He had two brothers James and Norman who also joined the Canadian army during the Second World War. His father also had served in France during the First World War.

The family grew up in Blind River, Ontario and attended the United Church. Harry completed Grade VIII and one year of high school and then left school at 16 to work. As a sailor, Harry was employed as a deckhand and a watchman for the Canada Steamship Lines during the summer

months. During the winter he cleaned and painted boats.




Harry alongside his brother Norman



On January 11, 1943, Harry married Doris Beulah in Blind River, Ontario.

Harry enlisted on September 15, 1943, in the Canadian Infantry Corps in Toronto, Ontario.



Harry stood five feet nine inches tall and weighed 156 pounds. He had hazel eyes and brown hair.


According to his military records, Harry didn't have any time for hobbies or sports. His personnel assessment reported that he was "a very likeable youth, decidedly mature for his age" and he had "a pleasant courteous manner." He was "reliable and capable of accepting responsibility." He obtained basic training in Brampton, Ontario, and further infantry training at Camp Borden.

Harry had left Canada and arrived on September 6, 1944 and arrived in the United Kingdom. He was moved to France on October 7 where he was transferred to the Royal Regiment of Canada.

On March 3, 1945, the Royal Regiment was involved in the Allied push through the Hochwald Gap in Germany. The companies encountered mortar and shell fire to be heavy and comparable to the days of Normandy landings.

It was on that day that Harry was wounded in the right thigh by a shell fragment. At age 21, Private Harry Allen died of his wounds that he received in action. He was temporarily buried at the Bedburg cemetery in Germany.

His wife received the sad message by telegram:

## HARRY ALLEN DIES OF WOUNDS

BLIND RIVER, March 14.—Thursday, Mr. and Mrs. Manley Allen received word that their son, Harry, had been seriously wounded in Germany. Saturday morning, the news of his passing was received just before noon. Harry was 21 years of gae and left September, 1944, for overseas.

Besides his parents, he is survived by his wife and two brothers both of whom are in the services. James left Saturday night for New Brunswick. Norman is in the Canadian Army Training School, Hamilton. Mr. Allen is a veteran of the First World War and is employed with the Forestry Branch in town.

His gravestone is inscribed with the words:

"NOT FORGOTTEN, HARRY DEAR,
WHILE LIFE AND MEMORY LAST.
WIFE DORIS FATHER & MOTHER"

Private Harry Manley Allen was awarded four medals:

- 1939-1945 Star
- France & Germany Star
- War Medal
- Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp


